


CHAIRMAN'S AWARD

>>> The Citrus County YMCA Advisory Board has been "Building What Matters" for nearly a decade, and now they are close to opening the YMCA of the Suncoast's newest location — the Citrus Memorial Health Foundation Branch.

Led by Co-Chairs Gerry Mulligan and Jewel Lamb, this was a team effort from the fundraising, land donation and community partnerships. The early handshakes and agreements led to the expansion of programs in 2007. With no permanent facility in the county, the Y partnered with schools, churches and local government to provide residents with a variety of services for all ages.

In 2014, the YMCA became the official provider of before and after school child care in all 11 Citrus County elementary schools. This passionate group is the epitome of "many hands make light work"!











STEWARDSHIP AWARD

>>> Lois Jenkins began her career with the YMCA in 1985. She served as YMCA of the Suncoast's vice president of finance.

When she was young, Lois thought being a hotel manager was her calling. Her favorite toy, growing up, was an adding machine because calculators were not invented yet.

However, it was managing the Y's financials that would be her mission. Lois loved working at the Y and engaging with staff, volunteers, members and being a part of the mission.

Lois stated her proudest moment was the success of her children in their education, careers and personal lives. For her dedicated leadership and advancement of the YMCA mission, Lois Jenkins posthumously receives the Stewardship Award from the YMCA of the Suncoast.

GPS VOLUNTEERS OF THE YEAR

FOR HEALTHY LIVING: JENNIFER JAYE

» Jennifer "Jenn" Jaye has been a healthy living volunteer for the past three years. She helps plan and facilitate Camp Living Springs, a cancer survivor retreat weekend funded by the Morton Plant Mease Foundation. When planning our camp activities, Jenn goes out of her way to make sure these will be meaningful, healthy activities for each of the survivors, no matter their age or abilities.

She spends endless hours researching and testing the activities, shopping for camp supplies and recruiting other volunteers and vendors to make the weekend experience exceptional. In 2015, Jenn stepped up and took on the head leadership role at camp. She organized the other volunteers and served as the liaison between the Morton Plant Mease staff and camp programming. The organization and programming were the best we have had yet, thanks to Jenn Jaye!

FOR YOUTH DEVELOPMENT: SEYMOUR "SIM" DAWSON

Seymour "Sim" Dawson is a strong advocate for youth development and fishing. Put the two together, ask Sim to be your captain, and you have the Clearwater YMCA Fishing Rodeo.

For a number of years Sim has been everything from the event's chair to a volunteer cutting bait. There's a reason why, for almost two decades, parents have signed up their kids to fish at Pier 60 — the volunteerism of Sim Dawson, a.k.a "the Squid Man."

While many youth anglers catch a variety of fish, all the kids have fun at an event that has become a mainstay on the YMCA calendar.

FOR VOLUNTEERISM: KATHERINE DIAZ AND KARI BUXTON

>>> In 2008, Katherine Diaz and Kari Buxton started volunteering at the Clearwater Y by taking an idea and bringing it to life. Together, Katherine and Kari created Camp COAST (Children On the Autism Spectrum Together). Almost a decade later, their idea is one of the top special needs summer camps in the Tampa Bay area. The summer camp is for children with autism and developmental disabilities that allow them to feel comfortable in a safe, fun and nurturing environment.

In fact, in order to help raise awareness and funding for Camp COAST the Clearwater YMCA developed the annual Spice It Up For Autism chili cook-off. In its fifth year, the event raises more than \$4,000 for Camp COAST. Thank you, Katherine and Kari, for your vision!

FOR PHILANTHROPY: CLARK STILLWELL

>>> Clark Stillwell is a member of the campaign team that helped raise \$8 million to build the Y in Citrus County. For years, a group of Citrus volunteers discussed building a Y to enhance the quality of life for residents.

Clark is firm believer his community can get healthy, confident, connected and secure with a YMCA. He was also instrumental in the final \$2.8 million donation from the Citrus Memorial Health Foundation.

The donation closed the \$8 million gap needed to build the new Citrus Y.



COMMUNITY PARTNER CHAMPION

>>> Pinellas County Schools is the recipient of YMCA of the Suncoast's first Community Partner Champion Award. Pinellas County Schools have been an integral partner in the advancement of our mission.

YMCA of the Suncoast serves more than 2,300 school children every day in pre-k through eighth grade just in Pinellas County. These students are in before and after school programs and meet the needs of working parents. In addition, we partner during summer camp with the bridge program to help close the achievement gap by extending learning time.

For teens, the YMCA's Youth In Government and Leaders' Club programs rely heavily on this relationship with the school district.

Additionally, YMCA's Diabetes Prevention Program serves to help those school system employees who are at greatest risk of developing diabetes.

NOTES

 Child Care and Camp fees increased \$869,000 from new programming in Citrus County (\$502,000) as well as one additional week of summer camp in most counties.


 Capital contributions from payments and pledges decreased due to reaching nearly the entire fundraising goal to construct the future YMCA facility in Citrus County in 2015. The new Citrus Memorial Hospital Foundation YMCA will open May 2016.

 Other contributions includes those for the annual fundraising campaign, for special purposes and for the endowment fund. Long-term pledges made to the endowment fund in 2015 were lower than in 2014, accounting for the decrease.
Other revenue includes returns on investments which experienced unrealized market losses in excess of income from dividends and interest.

W For 35 years, Elizabeth "Liz" Dubuque's YMCA career changed the lives of countless members, volunteers and staff.


